Block 1	St. Mary’s	Maryland Loyalists	13,750 acres, July 14, 1784, Daniel Fukes and others; opposite of river Ste. Ann’s (Fredericton)
Block 2	Kingsclear	2 <sup>nd</sup> New Jersey Volunteers	38,450 acres, July 14, 1784, Col. Isaac Allen and others
Block 3	Lower Queensbury	Guides and Pioneers	Nov. 9, 1787, John Parker and others; also New York Volunteers; Parishes of Bright and Queensbury
Block 4	Prince William	King’s American Dragoons	May 19, 1786, Francis Horseman and others; named after second son of George III
Block 5	Queensbury	Queen’s Rangers	Feb. 2, 1787, James Brown and others
Block 6	Canterbury	King’s American Regiment	Aug. 17, 1787, Tristman Hillman and others; sometimes called Block 4
Block 7	Southampton	Pennsylvania Loyalists	Aug. 17, 1787, William Burns and others
Block 8	Woodstock	1 <sup>st</sup> DeLancey’s	Oct. 15, 1784, Robert Brown and others; sometimes called Block 6
Block 9	Northampton	2 <sup>nd</sup> DeLancey’s	
Block 10	Wakefield	Loyal American Legion	Refused; also known as Arnold’s American Legion
Block 11	Brighton	Prince of Wales’ American Legion	Refused
Block 12	Simonds	Loyal American Regiment	Refused
Block 13	Peel	1 <sup>st</sup> New Jersey Volunteers	Refused
Block 14	Wicklow	3 <sup>rd</sup> New Jersey Volunteers	Refused
	St. George	Royal Fencible Americans	
	Quaco (St. Martins)	Kings Orange Rangers
