

Researching Members of the British Regular Military During the American Revolution



Many British soldiers came to North America as combatants in the American Revolution, participated in the war for years, some returning to Europe, while others remained and settled post-war in the British colonies.

A basic timeline for a British soldier of the American Revolution could include: birth; enlistment; regimental history (if they stayed in one military group or moved between multiple units); service during the war (posts, battles, taken prisoner, wounds); discharge and resettlement or retirement.

Note: “Regular” soldiers in the British Army who were dispatched from Great Britain are usually not considered loyalists, unless they had already retired from the British Army before the outbreak of the American Revolution and had settled in the Thirteen Colonies. Crossover did sometimes occur, where loyalist men were recruited into established regiments rather than new provincial/loyalist regiments, or when a provincial regiment became a regular British regiment, but this was not the standard route.

Primary Sources

Muster Rolls

The official function of muster rolls was that of enumeration of a particular military unit or crew of a ship, recorded by officers for administrative purposes to distribute pay.

Information which can be found in musters: location of military posts; participation in particular campaigns and battles; assignments given (e.g. guard, expedition, recruiting); advancement through the ranks by commissioned and non-commissioned officers; illness, injuries, and deaths; post abandonments; missing in action; taken as prisoner; transfers; and discharges.

Hessian Documents

The term “Hessian” refers to the special German auxiliary troops, serving under their own officers, used by Great Britain during the American Revolution. A treaty agreement existed between King George of England and German rulers, who received payment rather than going directly to the soldiers.

[Hessian Documents of the American Revolution : 1776 - 1783](#) from the Lidgerwood Collection held by the Morristown National Historical Park, New Jersey, is the largest source of primary documents on Hessians involved in the American Revolution. Transcripts include accounts of military campaigns and offer a record of the life and experiences of the German soldiers in America. They also give insight into the patriot, loyalist, and British forces.

□ Settlement Musters

Using the term muster roll in the wider sense, muster rolls sometimes included groups of veterans, their children, and wives, as well as civilian settlers.
