cost of over £1,400; The Parish found temporary accomodation in a Presbyterian place of worship. He-visited

St Margaret's Bay where the people have begun to collect towards building their own Church. Also the Military Settlement at Hammond's Plains where the soldiers have set about building a small Church; they are very poor and he recommends them to the Society's benevolence.

Considerable misunderstanding haw arisen as to Dr Inglis' successor at The Parishioners are of St Paul's. opinion that the appointment is in their gift, and by reason of their Memorial (see No.209, & 84. 66, Nos. 1 - 23.) that Mr Twining is the new Rector. Meanwhile S.P.C. have appointed Mr Willis who has arrived in Halifax demanding induction, which the Church Wardens refuse to allow the Attorney Ceneral to Relations between him and proceed with. Mr Willis have remained harmonious, but partication feeling waxes high through-Entreats justice from out the Parish. S.P.G. "that no misrepresentations to my prejudice may be hastily received." (S.P.G.'s official letter to Mr Twining to tell him that Mr Willis' had been appointed to St.Paul's, Halifax, before receipt of the Church Warden's Memorial, had evidently gone astray. The "case is fully calendared in 4.66, (as noted above)."

Shows great distress at the Society's decision, which is "virtually an exclusion from usefulness, from employment, even from support in my profession.

... No one can be more sensible than myself of the great and grievous errors into which I have been led by designing individuals who would have made me a tool for the accomplishment of ulterior measures of their own." Humbly asks if he may be received back into their service.

letters. The first he received while
seriously ill, and it "afforded the

Churchwardens and Vestry of St George's Sydney, C.B. Testimony to the merit of their Missionary, the Rev. Charles Inglis. 9 signatures.

Churchwardens and Vestry of St James! Memorial praying for aid towards the discharge of a debt incurred by the building of the Church in that parish. 12 signatures.

211. 1824, Ma**y**c**2**. Weymouth. The Rev.Alfred Gilpin. States that he has removed to Weymouth to take up his new appointment. to the Society's benevolence the Church The work is commodious and comfortable. at Wilmot was just beginning to open up when he left that parish. It is three years since he entered the Ministry, and owing to the Bishop's indisposition he is still awaiting priest's orders; laments the inconvenience to his flock who are deprived of the benefit of Holy Communion and whose younger members are growing up without the life of Confirmation.

212. 1827, Aug. 24 Weymouth.

He is endeavouring to form a congregation at a place 9 miles distant from Weymouth. The people had been left so long without any ministrations from the Church, that prejudice has preoccupied their minds and many have united with the Dissenters. They are now desirous of erecting a small Church, towards which he asks for a small grant from S.P.G. (Ed. £30 was granted.) Sends Notitia:

213. 1832, Dec. 31. Weymouth.

to Archdeacon Willis. Sends report for 1832. As often as possible he performs Evening Service at St Mary's Bay. (probably the proposed Church mentioned in No. 212). He has attempted to convey the light of truth by means of tracts printed at Paris, to the numerous French Roman Catholics in the district. In a footnote Bishop Inglis writes that the policy of his endeavours for the better instruction of Romanists living under the care of a very respectable Teacher—Abbe Sigogne, a French Emigrant—may be questioned, although the purity of his endeavours cannot."

He hopes to erect a small Church at Sheet Harbour. There are four Sunday Schools staffed by female teachers, day schools are not in such a flourishing condition owing to the difficulty of finding S.M.'s. He has done little travelling during the year as he lost his pony, and another one went lame; he often found the cold while out at night very searching to (his) slim bodily frame: "Outlines many of his." further activities.

233. 1855, June 12. Beaver Harbour. Ditto to Bishop. Annual Report for 1854, which he presents very late "owing to much prevailing sickness and many deaths happening." Despite the fact that he has been out in all weathers, and often taken services while wet through, his health has kept up wonderfully. Describes the foundering of a schooner and the gives funeral service of a captain; details of further death-bed scenes. He is much distressed that there is no longer either a day or a Sunday School at Marie Joseph.

William Nisbett, Catechist, to Bishop. Reports for 1827 of negroes at Preston and Hammond's Plains. Gives 8 full account of the hysterical demeanour gof the negroes, as the result of preachers deliberately working upon their ridiculous imaginations. It is inconvervable that human beings can be so mad; their morals are low, and it is difficult to make them industrious and honest, owing "to the want of proper standards of conduct in the white persons that reside among them." They are without any Christian Instruction. Hence the need of S.M.'s of integrity, as the present race of adults will never be brought to forsake these notions, but a favourable impression may be made upon the Recounts in full the story of children. a negro's illusion of his so-called conversion.

religious instruction among negroes at
Preston and Hammond's Plains. Of the
difficulties he encountered especially from
among the Baptists and black speakers.

243. 1827, May 22. Liverpool, Queen's County. The Rev. Edward Wix to Archdeacon Willis. (Copy).

The greater part of the population of 700 are Dissenters. The Church has been closed since Mr-Twining's death two years ago. He was received in the parish with warm attention. There is a lady's choir. members of the House of Assembly living in the neighbourhood afford him every possible assistance and have placed their horses at his disposal. He takes week-day services at two places on the outskirts of Liverpool, at one of which, Beach Meadows, the inhabitants are principally of German extraction. A promising committee of S.P.C?K. has been established, but at present most of the Christian Instruction is in the hands of the Wesleyans. He has visited Broad Cove, near Le Have where there is a settlement of the descendants of German Lutherans. thankful that there will now be a resident Missionary and resigns his charge to the Rev. James Moody.

Bends Notitia.

States in a note addressed to S.P.G. that he accompanied the Bishop of N.S. upon his visit to N.F.L., and was present at the Consecration of St John's Church.

244. 1827 Dec.12. Halifax.

Concerning a request for books, £6 worth of which have been given by S.P.C.K. Recommends the appointment of a S.M. at Liverpool. The people of Beach Meadows have begun to erect the frame of a new Church.

245. 1828, Sept.10. Halifax.

The Bishop is daily expected for an ordination, but haw not yet returned from his visit to N.Y. The Province is still without a Governor, but general expectation is fixed upon Sir Peregrine Maitland. Reports Mr Whalley's arrival in Halifax after a tedious passage. Asks S.P.G.'s advice rethe deficiency caused by Mr Benwell's departure with some of the money voted for the Porter's Lake Church.

246. 1829, Sept.7. Halifax.

Private & confidential). The Bishop is suffering from a serious bout of fever and has asked him to write in his place. He has heard with deep regret of Archdeacon's Best's death. Suggests that Archdeacon Coster should be transferred from N.F.L. and appointed in his place, for the climate of N.B. would be more beneficial to his health.

Ditto A subscription has been to Bishop. revived in lieu of providing a Parsonage, and at present amounts to £20 payable in produce of the Country. The Church must heeds be content to receive Glebe and School lands belonging to this Township, which by no means answer the intentions of the Government when they were reserved for the Church. "However . . . there are many portions of land belonging to us, which by & by will become highly valuable." Asks advice re. the management of these lands, of which he is conservator.

1830, July 1. St Eleanor's, P.E.I.

The Rev. William Walker.

Formal report with Notitia.

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1827, July 1. 262. -Guysborough. The Rev. Joshua Wingate Weeks. Report with Notitia. In May he was attacked by a severe illness. The township of Manchester is included in the parochial district of Guysborough in both of which townships the population has greatly increased. During his absence from duty the Services are read by a young barrister.

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263. New Dublin. Ditto's. Notitia for 1831.

1833, Jan. 2. 264. New Dublin. Ditto. Report with Notitia. "Annually I travel in pastoral duty, upwards of twenty two hundred miles, and that over roads at all times bad in many places; but in some places almost impossible." Feels inadequate to the responsibilities of such an arduous parish.

265. 1834, April 2. New Dublin.

Ditto Answer to circular re. to Bishop. He has 9 stations reduction of salary. to visit & has preached nearly 200 times. Fears that his income will no longer be sufficient to meet necessary expendature. His family consists of 4 persons. The district is scattered. He must keep a horse, and a man to look after it "when one returns home wearied." His constil tution is delicate, and he has undergone the greatest of hardships from fatigue and inclemency of the weather.

266. 1835, New Dublin.

Annual report with Notitia. to Bishop. (In parts illegible owing to immersion in the flood.)

267. 1836, Jan. 4. New Dublin. Ditto Annual report with Notitia. The S.School has been suspended as he is too much occupied with travelling and preaching "on the Lord's flay" to give it adequate attention. The interests of the Church appear to be gradually and quietly increasing.

268. 1839, Jan. 3 New Dublin. Ditto Annual report with Notitia. to Bishop. Owing to a ruptured blood vessel, for several Sundays he had to give up public speaking.

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1840.Jan.l New Dublin. Whe Rev. Joshus Wingate Weeks.

to Bishop. Annual report with Notitia.

In two districts the want of a proper place for holding Divine Service prevents some from attending. He deplores a great dearth of Communicants.

270. 1841, Jan. 1. New Dublin. to Bishop. Annual report with Notitia.

During the year he travelled over 2,200 miles and visited many distant stations.

His congregations amount to about 400 persons. The people at Broad Cove are erecting a Church 36 by 28 feet with a steeple, towards the cost of which S.P.C.K. have promised to give a donation.

271. 1842, Jan. 1 New Dublin. Ditto
to Bishop. Annual report with Notitia.
The people maintain that the C. of E., the
Lutheran, the Presbyterian, and Scottish
Churches are equally worthy of their esteem,
but the demand for prayer books increases an
he thinks that his labours are not in vain.
Owing to a difficulty in obtaining lumber,
the Church at Broad Cove is unfinished;
he trusts that it will be finished externally by next Summer.

272. 1843, Jan. 6. New Dublin. bitto
to Bishop. Annual report with Notitis.
For some time he was unable to officiate
in public owing to an injury in the chest,
caused by over exertion. He is now
recovered. "The Church in this Mission is
composed of persons from other denominations, for the most part, and their respective Churches and Ministers being so near,
is some cause of the work proceeding so
tardily." At Broad Cove the Church has
been externally completed; he hopes to
finish the interior this year.

273. 1844, Jan. 2. New Dublin. to Bishop. Annual report with Notitia.
The Church at Broad Cove is completed and ready for Consecration; he would be grateful for some books for it. Thanks the Venerable Societies for their aid in its erection. The district has been harassed by the extravagant proceedings of some of the Dissenters.

274. 1845 Jan.1 New Dublin. Ditto
to Bishop. Annual report with Notitia.
Thanks the Bishop for consecrating the
Church at Broad Cove last summer. Sunday
Schools do not flourish for the want of
suitable teachers.

275. 1846, Jan. 3. New Dublin. Ditto
to Bishop. Annual report with Notitia.
He fears that the "Schools are in a languid state . . Fishermen and persons of that class teach for a few months, and there is little encouragement to men of good morals and qualifications . And there is not much prospect of improvement in this respect as the Mission has suffered severel during the past year, through extensive fires, and Potato blight, and failure in the fishery, which have crippled the means

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of the inhabitants in a great degree."

276. 1848, Jan. 20. New Dublin. The Rev. Joshua Wingate Weeks.

to Bishop. MrpBrineIshpaetoral labours
have proved acceptable, but the order of
Priest would augment his usefulness. There
is a great house shortage and Mr Brine had
difficulty in obtaining a residence; the
congregation exerting themselves to erect
a parsonage, towards which he solicits help
from the Venerable Societies. His health
improves, though he is still unable to work
for his voice is so weak that he cannot even
read Service to his own family.

277. 1849, Dec. 31. New Dublin. Ditto
to Bishop. Annual report with Notitia.
The parsonage is completed and he is now residing in it. During the summer appalling fires raged, destroying the saw mills and whole forests in their train, as well as the dwellings of the husbandmen. This has caused much distress.

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The Case of the Rev. Cornelius Griffin.

(Some 130 deciments.) (C. [15] Horry (Mil)
In 1820 Mr Griffin was appointed to
George town, P.E.I., which according to his
statement was in the midst of uninhabited
forest with no Church and no house. He
failed to consolidate his position there,
and in 1824 was moved to Grand Manan. N.B.
Dissatisfied with conditions, he quitted the
parish without permission, violently abused.
S.P.G., and repeatedly behaved in so
eccentric a manner that two years later he
was asked to resign. He refused and the
Society were forced to dismiss him. He
railed against their "false, foul, and
scandalous imputations", and upon his parishioners sending memorials, asked to be
-appointed to Bridgetown, but without

effect.

He returned to England and in 1828

presented a petition to both Houses of

Parliament demanding justice. During the
ensuing years Covernment grants to North

America amounting to £16,000 were withdrawn
from S.P.C., and Mr Griffin alleged that It
was as a direct consequence of his intervention.

He was given the curacy of St Nicholas, Guildford, and set up a school at Godalming. He was "denied the exercise of his function as Glergyman," by the Bishop of Winchester's (The Rt. Rev. "Charles Richard Summer) ("persecution". In 1834 he brought a bill of indictment against the Bishop and others, but in the trial which followed lost his case. He was reduced to "frantic poverty" and repeatedly importuned S.P.G. for money. Finally he was given a compassionate grant of £100:

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
