1825 Copy of petition to H. E. Sir Peregrine Maitland from the President and Members of the Board for the General Superintendance of Education in Upper Canada, concerning school lands. 1823.

Extract of a despatch from the Rt. Hon. Earl Bathurst to H. H. Major General Sir Peregrine Maitland, conveying His Majesty's consent for the appropriation of a portion of the Reserves set aside for the establishment of an University for the support of schools on the national plan of education." Copy of memorandum delivered by J. B. Robinson on this subject attached. February, 1825.

Letter, John Strachan, York, to John B. Robinson, Colonial Office, Downing Street, London. Tells of the efforts to secure him (J.B.R.) an allowance, towards expenses of his prolonged stay in London as a representative during the discussion of the Union Bill there. Comments on the change of opinion towards Union in Montreal, in the Legislature. Hopes H. M. Gov't will relinquish the measure "or if not that they will come boldly forward & give us 70 members & appoint the meeting of the Parliament within this Province. There would be no injustice - to make this a British Colony - we must have a decided majority." Gives the resolutions concerning Union which were passed by the House; also copy of an address to H. M. from the Legislative Council opposing the Union. February 27, 1825.

Surveyor General's Report on School Lands. March 27, 1825.

Letter, John Richardson, Montreal, to Hon. & Rev. Dr. Strachan. Reports the business of the Session at Quebec as having gone on more smoothly than before. "This can only be attributed to the fear of the Union, for in fact (is) regarded a continuance of attempts to assume unconstitutional powers, they (the Assembly) were warned and even went beyond what the United States, when British Colonies, claimed." Refers to the changing hopes and fears of the Unionists and Anti-Unionists. Has heard from Mr. Ellice in London that he thinks the Union Bill will carry, unless war interfere. "The idea of going on harmoniously as we are, is preposterous and prospective adjustment of proportions of duties by arbitration is more so - while each province has equal rights but a division of interests upon a common object, the breach must widen and something more serious than a conflict of words finally ensue. I do not expect marvels from the Union but it would remove many impediments to the common prosperity & improvement, & make this a British instead of a foreign Province." Refers to a claim of Mr. Desrivieres against the McGill devise. April 14, 1825.

His Excellency requests that the attention of the Executive Council be given to the appointment of a general Board of Education in Upper Canada whose first duty will be the appropriations of "some portion of the lands set aside for the endowment of an University."  Letter, R. Wilmot Horton, Downing Street, to J. B. Robinson, Is pleased to hear of the successful embarkation of Peter Robinson's emigrants from the south of Ireland. "Whether this plan will be continued on an extensive scale or not, will depend mainly on the realization of a fund (whether in the nature of public tax or private subscription) which will repay by way of annuity to Government the interest & capital of any loan specifically advanced by Government for that purpose. As a mere vote of public money, I have great doubts whether there would not be serious opposition to carrying the measure any further, as contrary to sound principles, unless it could be shewn (which I am rather disposed to think might be the case) that as a police measure the removal of the disaffected part of the population may be deemed advisable." July 7, 1825.

 Letter, John Strachan to the Hon. Samuel Smith, John Small, D. Cameron, and Thos. Ridout, Trustees of the Home District School, resigning his position as head master of the District Grammar School, having been appointed President of the General Board for the Superintendance of Education in Upper Canada. Letter, Samuel Smith, John Small, D. Cameron and Thos. Ridout, Trustees of the Home District School, to the Hon. & Rev. Dr. Strachan expressing their appreciation of his merits and of "the great benefits which this District in particular and the Province in general have received" from his labours, & wishing him well in his new post. July 23, 1823.

Letter, Rev. Alex'r M. Bethune, Cobourg, to Rev. Dr. Strachan, thanking him for kindnesses in connection with his certificates. Plans to proceed at once to his parish. September 4, 1823.

1824 Address from the Clergy Corporation of the Church of England to Sir Peregrine Maitland, protesting "the unexpected and extraordinary claims of the Ministers in connexion with the Kirk of Scotland to participate in those rights and privileges and especially in the Clergy Reserves though secured to us by the gift of the most pious of Sovereigns and confirmed by an Act of the Imperial Parliament." 1824 (?) Reply attached.

Copy of Memorial from John Strachan to H.E. Sir Peregrine Maitland begging that he will recommend to Earl Bathurst a modification of the compensation allowed him "for the deterioration of the living" during his incumbency. January 26, 1824.

Letter, R. Wilmot Horton, Downing Street, to J. B. Robinson. Announces the appointment of Mr. Stuart as Attorney General of Lower Canada. Does not expect the question of Union of the Provinces to be decided for some time; nor that anything further will be done for emigration at present but will be glad to receive any further information as to conditions. March 5, 1824.

Memorandum signed by P. Robinson giving the substance of a conversation with Mr. Horton on the subject of the Union of the Provinces. April 10, 1824.

Letter, C. Stewart, 57. Davies Street, -----, to Dr. Strachan. Wishes better information concerning the Church of England in Canada than that furnished the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. Can furnish him with a statement of the labours of the English Clergy at Quebec. April 13, 1824.

Copy of a paper from Woolwich on the Union. Sent to Mr. Horton and referred to Dr. Strachan. April 25, 1824.

Same to same, sending suggestions for amendments to the Union Bill and requesting that it be printed to accompany Messrs. Stuart & Papineau's pamphlets when the subject is referred to the Cabinet as containing much new and useful information. June 5, 1824.

Same to same. Is disappointed that the creation of a Bishopric of Upper Canada is being postponed. "I did indulge the expectation that H. M. Gov't would readily bestow upon me an office to which no other clergyman in either of the Canadas can with equal justice aspire." Had thought that "the retirement of the present Lord Bishop of Quebec offers a favourable opportunity for making such changes in the Ecclesiastical Establishment as the increased settlement of the Canadas now require." ----- However is prepared to acquiesce in his appointment of Archdeacon of Upper Canada with the usual allowance "but without interfering with the Rev. Geo. O'Kill Stuart already Archdeacon in that Province and I hope you will add the assurance of my succeeding to the Bishopric should the Diocese of Quebec be divided on the retirement, resignation or death of the present incumbent." July 10, 1824. Endorsed "Not sent".

Extract of a despatch from Lord Bathurst, dated 17th July, 1824, regarding a grant to Dr. Strachan of £225 per annum from the King's Rights, to make up for lack of income from certain non-productive lands.

Letter, John Richardson, Montreal, to Rev. Dr. Strachan. Regrets the delay in passing the Union Bill but trusts it will be carried soon. Is opposed to the idea of a federated union of the British North American provinces for the present. Comments on various points of the Union Bill - the wisdom of introducing the commercial laws and customs of England into Lower Canada; the propriety of fixing the place of meeting of the United Legislature; the King's supremacy and circumscribing the power exercised by the B. C. Bishop of Quebec; and powers and jurisdiction respecting the Bishop or Bishops appointed or to be appointed for Canada. Refers to the Canada Company.

1825 Draft of report by John Strachan to H. H. Sir Peregrine Maitland giving his observations on the report of the Commissioners appointed by H. M. Gov't to value the lands to be purchased by the proposed Canada Company, June 14, 1825.

Letter, G. Hillier, Government House, York, to Mr. John Strachan, notifying him of his appointment as Teacher of the Public School in each of the several Districts of the Province, July 19, 1825.

Letter, General William Johnston, Edinburgh's Hotel, London, to Samuel Jarvis, York. Does not belong any longer to the 62th Reg't, so has no immediate prospect of visiting Canada. Writes concerning his land near St. Catharines, suggesting a new tenant. "I am told the Holland Canal is going on and Mr. Road says he has been called on for the whole of my share, \$120, which I have credited him with." August 1, 1825.

Letter, John Richardson, Montreal, to Es. J. Strachan. Promises to have his 3 cases of books looked after on their arrival. Hopes the changes in Colonial Policy will have the good effects intended. "One thing is certain that H. M. Ministry have given evident proofs of their favorable disposition towards Canada." Considers Lord Dalhousie's return "a most happy one for E. Canada." September 24, 1825.

Letter, E. Hillier, Government House, to the Chairman, Board of Education, Home District, stating that as Mr. Strachan has been appointed President of the newly formed Board for the General Superintendance of Education in Upper Canada, that all communications concerning public schools be sent to him. "It is hoped that this will lead to the establishment of a general system of public education for the whole Province, as it will doubtless be of importance that whenever circumstances shall permit of the endowment of the long contemplated University, that the students who shall be assembled in it, shall not be impeded in their further pursuits of learning by a dissimilarity in the previous systems of education in which they may have been trained." October 24, 1825.

Despatch from Sir Peregrine Maitland to the Earl Bathurst, suggesting an exchange of a portion of the lands set apart for the establishment and support of an University, for an equal quantity of the Reserves remaining in the Crown as being under lease which might be rendered available immediately for that desirable object. December 19, 1825. Duplicate.

Gives some advice as to the statutes of the College and some hints as to the studies. Suggests a botanic garden "is less necessary at the beginning than many other things."---- "Do no attempt to force all your men to be classical scholars but rather encourage that department by medals, &c." June 27, 1826.

Letter, Anthony Hamilton, 42 Castle Street, Leicester Square, to Rev. Dr. Strachan, notifying him of a grant from the Incorporated Society for the Propagation of the Gospel of £500 "towards the purchase of a College Library." July 5, 1826.

Letter, Thos. Duncan, St. Andrews, to Dr. J. Strachan. Has sent him some pamphlets and tells of some college activities. October, 1826.

Extract from a letter addressed to Mr. Partlock, Royal Engineers, by T. G. Anderson, Esq., Resident Agent for Indian Affairs at Brummond's Island, Lake Huron, 6th November, 1826. Asks help for "the instruction and civilization of the natives of this country." Tells of the progress made by some of the Indian children in school.

Letter, John Strachan, London, to Rev. Dr. Brown, Edinburgh. Has just heard from the King's Advocate General that H. M. law officers have settled the draft of the charter. "My next object is to get a law passed to enable His Majesty to sell a portion of the Clergy Reserves and at the same time a charter to incorporate the clergy of Upper Canada for the purpose of superintending the sale and lease of the reserves. Has just heard of the death of young Mr. Barclay after his return from a long journey of about 900 miles on horseback to the western part of the province. Has arranged for his own son to go into the army. Has been busy making an abstract of the evidence given before a Committee of the House of Commons on emigration. "When I finish it, I shall consider myself as having a claim on Mr. Horton, the Under Secretary, to do something for me & this something I shall limit to hurrying my bill through the House as fast as possible," December 15, 1826.

Draft of letter, John Strachan to the Earl Bathurst, recommending the appointment of Col. Givens, as successor to Col. Claus, the Deputy Superintendent of Indian Affairs, stating some of his qualifications and services. December 28, 1826.

Has been in rather poor health. Desires his letter dealing with the conduct of Mr. Willis, should be published "in the U. E. Loyalist and the other respectable Canadian journals." April 27, 1829.

Subscriptions for erecting a new Protestant Episcopal Church in the Town of York, the amount advanced by the several subscribers to be deducted from the price of pews purchased by them on the completion of the Building. May 5, 1829.
