Letter, George Dyett, Secretary to the Indian Commission, to the Bishop of Toronto, sending a "paper of queries intended to elicit information respecting the condition" of the Indians. January 6, 1843.

Draft of reply of the Bishop of Toronto to Sam'l Jervis, denying charges made against Mr. Jarvis by two Indian Chiefs. January 9, 1843.

Letter, Charles Bagot, Kingston, to the Bishop of Toronto, introducing "Mr. Croft, our new Chemical Professor."
Reports his health slowly improving. January 14, 1843.

Draft of letter, the Bishop of Toronto to Sir Charles Bagot stating his opinion that no step should be taken in the matter of the charges against Col. Jarvis wintil some proof has been demanded and given of the alleged misconduct." January 15, 1843.

Letter, Charles Bagot to the Bishop of Toronto, giving his position in relation to the charges made against Col. Jarvis in his position of Sup't of Indian Affairs. January 25, 1843.

Sir Robert Peel, with other papers, concerning the endowment of the Bishopric of Toronto. February 15th to May 22nd, 1843.

Letter, Rev. Wm. Ritchie to the Bishop of Toronto, giving a sketch of his education, training, and various experiences and enclosing certificates, &c., vouching for the same. Expresses a desire to take orders in the Church. February 16, 1843.

Letter, Charles Bagot to the Bishop of Toronto.
Considers his health as still most precarious. Is
much concerned that the question of precedence of
the staff of King's College should be settled according
to Faculties. Fenruary 28, 1843.

Letter, the Archbishop of Canterbury to the Bishop of Toronto. Has been appealed to by the Churchwardens and Special Committee of St. Paul's, Woodstock, requesting his help towards terminating the differences between the Bishop of Toronto and the Rector and Congregation of Woodstock. Advises him "that if any fair opening should present itself for a reconciliation without compromising the dignity of your office, it might be advisable to make use of it, for the sake of putting an end to contention." Sends a copy of his letter to the Churchwardens, concerning the suspension of Mr. Bettridge. March 23, 1843.

Copy of letter, T. G. Anderson, S.I.A., Manitowaning, to Col. S. P. Jarvis, C.S.I.A., Kingston, commenting on certain requisitions of the missionary which articles he does not think are "usually supplied by the Public." Sees no need for a second bell and does not approve of the Indian Testaments being used as text books "because the intercourse of the rising generation must be with the whites and it therefore appears to me the teaching them in their own language is time and labor lost." Thinks the children should rule their own foolscap for copy books. March 4, 1843.

Certificate of Lewis Burwell, D'y Surveyor, concerning the survey of the Town of Brantford, particularly that part laid out for the Church of England. March 7, 1843.

Letter, H. Bagot, Private Sec'y, Gov't House, Kingston, to the Bishop of Toronto, covering two statutes to be laid before the Council of King's College. March 18, 1853.

Draft of letter, the Bishop of Toronto to Dr. John McCaul, Is much disturbed over some decisions of Sir Charles Bagot in regard to the staff of King's College.
March 19, 1845.

Letter, J. B. Robinson to the Bishop of Toronto. Is also disturbed over conditions at King's College. "The Law Professorship should have no salary attached to it at present - the pupils might give their a guineas or so for the course of lectures. The Medical Department seems to make to be the most extravagantly provided for. I do not balieve the Council would assent to the scale. I predict that there will soon be a break up in U. C. College. Dr. McGaul should not have left it (of at all) until his successor had taken charge. March 21, 1843.

Memorahum of the Bishop of Tronto and report of C. Widmen Concurring the odorsability of establishing a Middle School in connection with the University of The College, March 21, 1843. Draft (Transferred for 1842)

Copy of letter to Sir Charles Bagot from the Bishop of Toronto. Points out the method of laying the Statutes before the College Council. Hopes a suitable person has been chosen as Principal of Upper Canada College, in place of Dr. McCaul. "I shall be happy if a few weeks experience do not shew that it was unfortunate to deprive U. C. College which now contains nearly 200 scholars of its head until, at least, a successor worthy of the College had arrived to supply his place." March 21, 1843.

Letter, H. Bagot, Private Sec'y, Gov't House, Kingston, to the Bishop of Toronto. Has decided to await the arrival of Dr. McCaul at Kingston, "in order to consult with him upon the subject of the University, as it appears to him evident that neither this nor several other points connected with it, which remain for adjustment, can be satisfactorily settled by correspondence." Denies the rumour that Mr. Meredith is about to be proposed as Principal of Upper Canada College. March 23, 1843.

Letter, Robert Peel to the Bishop of Toronto. Denies that the Government are in any way pledged to provide endowment for the Bishopric of Upper Canada "upon the the grounds of justice and good faith," and refers him to the Secretary of State for the Colonial Dept. as to whether provision may be made from the Glergy Reserves Fund. March 23, 1843.

Appeal of the Incorporated Society for the Progagation of the Gospel in Foreigh Parts, in behalf of the Church and its Missions in the Golonies and Dependencies of the British Empire. March 24, 18451
