 - Title is *Marching Regiments of Foot*, state referred to in circular of 12, July 1806; Shows regimental ranks and rate of pay allowance previous to 25 June 1806 and commencing thereafter; contains additionally handwritten notes in margins; rest of document is typescript

 - Colonel Franklin, John Creighton per his order in favor of Christopher **Jesson** [?]

 - Tabular, includes numbers for each named regiment of soldiers and staff; regiments include: First and Second Company of Halifax Artillery, First Battalion of Halifax (including black company), Navy Yard Volunteers, 2nd and 3rd Battalion of Halifax, Lunenburg Regiment excluding Lunenburg Chester Artillery, Queens County Regiment excluding Artillery Company, First Through 4th Battalion of Shelburne (Shelburne, Yarmouth, Barrington, Argyle), Acadia Battalion, Digby Regiment, Annapolis Regiment, Cumberland Regiment including Captain Roach's Volunteer Company, 1st and Second Battalions of Kings County, 1st and Second Battalions of Hants County, Colchester Regiment, Pictou and Sydney Regiments; Remark at bottom of document that some returns for some regiments are

numbers from a previous year, one explanation noted was there had been no return recorded

 - His response was he didn't know of the law and first showed up at Captain Wallace's Ward, a place wherein he lived; Captain Liddel gave positive reference; refers to Militia Act and its severity on this matter

 - Signed: 14 February, Halifax, John George Pyke, Quartermaster general ; covers 1808-1811

 - Signed: 15 June, 1811, Onslow, Nova Scotia; concerning men suspected as Navy deserters found at foot of Folly Hill and militia's role; mentions Capt. McElhenney, the Inn of Robert Flemming, Lieuts. E.B. Cutter and Wier, surgeon David Lynch and their assistance

Dodge's Company); he also recommended Private Woodbury who is known not to do his training and was fined but the Col. reduced it; each company in the battalion is dissatisfied "if such conduct is to be allowed of it will be impossible for any officer to do the Duty Required....we are fearful if there is not a stop put to his proceedings, it will be detrimental to the public service;" lists names, starting with Captain of the 20th Battalion Charles Dodge and Lieutenant Josiah Dodge

- Complaining of the conduct of Major Benson and Captain Nichols: defends his abilities and performance; finds it difficult to do his work on account of the conduct of Major Benson and Captain Nichols who have been the cause of much disorder in the Battalion for more than 2 years; Inspecting Field Officer affected such that has found much trouble doing his job; staff adjutant has suffered much abuse on account of the groundless censures and improper conversation by them in the presence of the men; with reference to Beardsley himself, Benson had stated that due to not being recommended for paymaster appointment, he would do what he could to have Beardsley removed, and "has in this fully kept his word" spreading false reports; requests assistance countering this communication "otherwise while they remain in office, no satisfactory services can be expected"

- Complaining of Col. Beardsley: felt compelled to write by the complaint of the officers of the 20th of the *ridiculous conduct* of Lt. Col. Beardsley's pocket; additional notation: remarkable why Benson's father should be fetched being 30 miles and upwards of 90 years old when Col. Bayard and Ruggles was much closer

- Concerns the complaints against Beardsley: Indicates in August, was at house of Mr. Phinney and was at the store when Lt. Col. Beardsley asked to see some combs; Mrs. Phinney noticed one was missing soon after and asked Beardsley if he had it, to which he denied and agreed to help search the store; Mr. Robinson entered the store and offered to search, finding the comb in Beardsley's pocket; after this Nichols desired him to pay, which he did
