Resolution, empowering the corporation of Kingston to enforce payment of the money due upon the rolls issued, and affessments laid, in the city and parish of Kingston, by a clause in the poll-tax law, passed in the year 1805, and directing them to pay over the balance to the commissioners for erecting the bridge over Yallahs River, 630.
