A humble address and petition to his majesty, recommended in the report of the committee appointed to inquire into the steps that have been taken in the parliament of the United Kingdom to abolish the slave-trade, &c. 226; committee appointed to prepare it, 253; reported; engrossed, 267; read, 269; most humbly praying his majesty's protection for securing to them the sole means of carrying on their plantations, by a supply of labourers from Africa, and the enjoyment of a reasonable profit from them, by continuing the reciprocal monopoly established by salutary laws and ancient usage, and humbly praying that his majesty will be pleased to direct his ministers to bring under the review of parliament their calamitous situation from the effects of the present exorbitant duties on their staples, in the hope that by his majesty's most gracious interposition such an alteration may be made as will preserve from utter ruin his majesty's faithful people of Jamaica, passed, and sent to the council for their concurrence, 270; message from the council, informing the house that they decline concurring; ordered that the commissioners of correspondence do transmit to the agent the report of the committee on which the humble address and petition was founded, with instructions to have the same printed, and distributed to the members of both houses of parliament, and to such other persons as he shall deem proper, 280; his honour desired to transmit the petition, 292.

II. (*Ibid.*)—Select committee appointed to prepare a humble address to his majesty, on the order of council for prohibiting the intercourse with America, 266; message and papers referred to the same committee, 288; address, with sundry statements relative thereto, reported, *ibid.*; read, deprecating the ruinous consequences which must attend the interruption of the intercourse with America; informing his majesty that they have humbly represented the same to his majesty's representative, but their application for the continuance of the intercourse has been refused; stating that the necessities of subsistence for themselves and their slaves, and the lumber necessary for carrying on their plantations, cannot be obtained, nor the supplies for his majesty's navy and army procured, without a continuance of the intercourse, and expressing the fullest confidence that his majesty, on having made known to him the grievances of his faithful and loyal subjects, however distant, will direct the proper relief; passed, 291; ordered that the committee of correspondence do transmit to the agent copies of the petition and address to his majesty, together with the statements reported therewith; his excellency desired to transmit it, 292.

III. (6 Sess. A. 1806.)—Humble representation and petition of the council and assembly of Jamaica, shewing that they approach the throne with the deepest regret, to lay before his majesty the ruinous consequences of those measures lately adopted in the imperial parliament, for the abolition of the slave-trade, having no other resource but in the wisdom and justice of his majesty; representing the hardship and injustice of the measure, the ruin and depopulation of the colony which must follow its adoption, and viewing with horror the consequence of such experiments in a neighbouring colony; stating the loss that must ensue to the navigation, commerce, manufactures, and general interest of the British empire, besides their own loss, for which they are entitled to compensation, as they cannot be subjected to punishment while guilty of no crime; complaining of the injustice of the two houses of parliament, and of the influence of visionary, theoretic innovators, and appealing to his majesty for the exercise of his prerogative to avert the threatened ruin; resolved on; presented; committed, 451; reported; engrossed, 456; read, 465; passed; message to the council, desiring their concurrence, 466; agreed to by them; council acquainted that the blanks are filled up; committee of correspondence instructed to transmit it to the agent, to be by him presented in the most acceptable manner; council concur in the instruction, 469.

IV. (7 Sess. A. 1807.)—The humble address, representation, and petition of the assembly of Jamaica, setting forth the ruinous consequences which have already resulted from the abolition of the slave-trade, the deterioration of their properties, the desertion of the interior settlements, the depopulation of the island, and the spirit of insubordination and revolt manifested by the slaves; stating their right to the fullest compensation for their losses, and trusting to his majesty's goodness to direct his

ministers to have the act brought again under the review of parliament, that those enactments, which interfere with their internal government and personal liberty, may be absolutely repealed; resolved on, 600; reported; committed, 608; engrossed, 609; read; passed, 611; sent to the council for their concurrence, 617; council decline concurring, 624; committee of correspondence directed to transmit it to the agent, to be presented in the most acceptable manner, 629.

To the Lieutenant-Governor.

V. (11 Sess. A. 1802.)—For his speech at opening the session, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it; speech referred, 3; address prepared, 5; read, expressing thanks for the speech; cordially accepting his honour's congratulations on the conclusion of the war; acknowledging his majesty's paternal solicitude for their welfare, and their conviction that they owe their present tranquillity to the vigilance of his fleets and armies; promising to provide the necessary supplies as usual, and bestow their most temperate consideration upon the subjects that may come before them; passed; his honour appoints to be attended; his answer, 6.

VI. (1 Sess. A. 1803.)—For his speech at opening the session, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it; speech referred, 86; address prepared, 87; read, thanking his honour, though deeply impressed with the danger of this colony, for not having convened them before the usual time for the meeting of the legislature; asserting the loyalty of the inhabitants of Jamaica, and that they shall not be found wanting, in the present crisis, in exertions and sacrifices to secure the enviable inheritance of British subjects; promising to provide the supplies as usual, though deeply lamenting that their increased burthens have exhausted the sources of liberality; assuring his honour, that while the British government continues to afford its protection, they will cheerfully co-operate in every measure which may tend to the security of the island; passed, 88; his honour appoints to be attended; his answer, 89.

VII. (2 Sess. A. 1804.)—For his honour's speech at opening the session, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it; speech referred, 178; address prepared, 179; read, expressing thanks for the speech, joining his honour in grateful acknowledgments to Providence for the return of the seasonable rains, and to the British government for the removal of the French prisoners; relying on the justice of the cause in which his majesty's arms are engaged, they look forward with the confident hope of success; expressing their satisfaction in being assured of his majesty's confidence in their attachment, and reflecting with pleasure on their having contributed their full share to the exigencies of the state; promising to raise the necessary supplies, and to co-operate with his honour in every measure that may promote the welfare of the island; passed, 180; his honour appoints to be attended; his answer, 181.

VIII. (*Ibid.*)—Respecting the order in council announcing the termination of the intercourse with America, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it, 256; read, stating that they have seen with the deepest concern the order of council of the 21st November, announcing the termination of the intercourse between America and this island in six months from that date; that the fatal consequences which must result from such a measure have impelled them to represent to his honour the alarm and apprehensions it has excited, it being notorious that, without a continuance of this intercourse, the lumber necessary for carrying on the plantations cannot be obtained, sustenance for themselves and their slaves cannot be supplied, nor provisions for the navy and army; soliciting that his honour will be pleased to direct a reconsideration of the order, and recal the publication of such a resolution, until the assembly have an opportunity of representing to his majesty the certain and immediate destruction that will impend over their lives and properties, if the regulation they now deprecate be adopted; passed; his honour appoints to be attended, 262; his answer, 263.

IX. (3 Sess. A. 1805.)—For his speech at opening the session, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it; speech referred, 294; address prepared, 295; read, expressing thanks for the speech; regretting that the appearance of a French force to windward had rendered martial law necessary; assuring his honour that they will always attend their public duty with cheerfulness; rejoicing in the testimony his honour gives to the forwardness

wardness of the inhabitants to second his views, and adopt measures of defence; expressing their confidence that his honour will concur in every measure for the economical expenditure of the public money, and for limiting the duration of the expence, by putting an end, as soon as possible, to the evils attending upon martial law; passed; his honour appoints to be attended; his answer, 296.

X. (3 Sess. A. 1805.)—For his message conveying notice of the termination of martial law; select committee appointed to prepare it; prepared; read, returning thanks for the message, and for the promptitude of his orders for the discontinuance of martial law; expressing their sense of his honour's zeal for the safety of the island, his judgment and vigilance in preparing measures of defence, and his attention to their commercial and agricultural interests, amidst the necessary preparations; passed; his honour appoints to be attended, 300; his answer, 301.

XI. (*Ibid.*)—Memorial and representation respecting the intercourse with America, resolved on; prepared; read; setting forth in strong terms the mischiefs which have followed the interdiction in times past, the wisdom of the measure of opening the intercourse on several occasions, and the ruinous consequences which must unavoidably follow the present interdiction, 301; passed, with schedules annexed, substantiating the facts advanced; his honour appoints to be attended; his answer, 305.

XIV. (5 Sess. A. 1805.)—For his speech at opening the session, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it; speech referred; address committed; amended; engrossed, 319; read, expressing thanks for his honour's speech at opening the session, and for having called them together at the usual season, notwithstanding his expectation of a successor in the course of the ensuing month; participating with his honour in the pleasure he feels from the tranquillity which has prevailed since their last meeting; professing their satisfaction from the information that no extraordinary supplies will be required, and their gratification at his honour's assurance of his readiness to co-operate in whatever may tend to the security and prosperity of this valuable colony; passed, 320; his honour appoints to be attended, 321; his answer, 322.

XV. (*Ibid.*)—For expressing the sentiments of the house on the intimation given by his honour of his approaching departure, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it, 406; address reported; committed; engrossed, 407; read, begging leave to express to his honour the sentiments excited by his in-

tended departure; stating that the example set before the militia, by the indefatigable exertions which his honour made to inspect, animated them with the laudable emulation of rivalling each other in the approbation of their commander in chief; that the consciousness of improvement in military discipline tended to give them confidence during the late threatened invasion, more particularly when they contemplated the experienced abilities and military talents of him whom their sovereign had appointed to command them; under these impressions the house are desirous to assure his honour of their sincere wishes for his enjoyment of that prosperity and happiness which the merited approbation of his majesty, and the possession of whatever is amiable in private life, cannot fail to secure him; passed; his honour appoints to be attended; his answer, 408.

XVI. (6 Sess. A. 1806.)—For his speech at opening the session; resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it; speech referred, 435; reported; committed; engrossed, 437; read, 438; returning thanks for the speech; expressing their warmest acknowledgments to his majesty, for having appointed to the government, at a period so critical, a person of such distinguished merit, and their lively sense of the expressions with which he has met the assembly of Jamaica; regretting the continuance of the war, and contemplating the brilliant victories gained by his majesty's arms, as conducing to the attainment of an honourable peace; thanking his honour for the assurances of his regard for their privileges, and of his attention to economy in the expenditure of the public money; promising their serious attention to the measures that may be laid before them, and their co-operation in those conducive to the general good; expressing their gratitude for his honour's early attention to the militia, and the care with which he has compiled a code for their regulation; and engaging to bestow the utmost attention upon the law which regards an establishment so essential to their safety; promising cheerfully to grant the necessary supplies, and anticipating an administration of energy and integrity; passed, 439; his honour appoints to be attended; his answer, 440.

XVII. (7 Sess. A. 1807.)—For his speech at opening the session; committee appointed to prepare it; speech referred, 555; address prepared; committed; reported, 556; considered, 557; read, 558; expressing thanks for the speech, and their sensibility of his honour's uniform desire to promote the public benefit; regretting the reverses that our allies have suffered, but trusting in an honourable peace, from the unimpaired resources of the British empire; promising their serious attention to the lessening their dependence on others for a supply of provisions by their internal resources; acknowledging his majesty's goodness in extending the establishment of free-ports; expressing their satisfaction at the improved state of the militia, and of the forts; and engaging to co-operate with his honour in every measure tending to promote the general weal, and the safety of the island; passed; his honour appoints to be attended; his answer, 559.

XVIII. (*Ibid.*)—For his good conduct and zeal for the public service while in the government of this island, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it; presented; engrossed, 632; read; expressing their gratitude for his conduct during the period of his administration; their veneration of the perfect purity and strict integrity which has characterized every measure; their warmest admiration of the zeal displayed by him for the welfare of the colony, in his sedulous attention to the duties of his office, evinced in the improvement of the militia, and in the spirit and prudence manifested in the prompt measures he took to crush a meditated revolt; assuring him that his open and ingenuous manners have endeared to them his private character, and impressed them with the deepest regret at his being about to leave this country; that their attachment and esteem are unalterable; that their best wishes attend him; that he may possess the fullest confidence of his sovereign, and arrive at higher honours; and that himself and family may enjoy every blessing which a continuance of health, and an increase of prosperity and reputation, can afford; passed, 637; his honour appoints to be attended; his answer, 638.

A. 1805.)—Message from his honour, requesting the house to direct the repayment of the additional duties on wines imported for the use of the troops in this island, and since, by order of government, transferred to the naval department, as if the same had been originally imported for the use of the navy, referred to committee on state of the island, 335; resolution for a message, informing his honour that the house are not authorized by law to order repayment of the said duties, 359.

- YALLAHS RIVER**—Ordered that the grant from the committee of roads for a bridge over Yallahs River be exempted from the restrictions and forms under which road grants are made payable, and that the amount be remitted to England, for the purpose of purchasing the materials for an iron bridge, 535.
- Resolution, empowering the corporation of Kingston to enforce payment of the money due upon the rolls issued, and assessments laid, in the city and parish of Kingston, by a clause in the poll-tax law, passed in the year 1805, and directing them to pay over the balance to the commissioners for erecting the bridge over Yallahs River, 630.
