I. (8 Sess. A. 1808.)

On motion a committee appointed to prepare it; reported, committed; ordered to be engrossed, 4; read, assuring his majesty that no part of his loyal subjects have received with more joy and satisfaction the intelligence of the great events that have distinguished the inhabitants of Spain and Portugal, and that with pride they contemplate the magnanimity with which his majesty has extended the energies of the state in support of the glorious cause for which they contend, thanking his majesty for sending to preside over them his grace the duke of Manchester, a nobleman of high rank, benevolent disposition, and eminent judgment; passed and sent to the council, desiring their concurrence, 7; the council concur in the address; the house informed thereof, 9; the council informed that the address is filled up accordingly, and a committee appointed to join a committee of the council to wait on his grace, and request him to transmit the same in the most acceptable manner, to which his grace agrees, *ibid*.

II. (9 Sess. A. 1809.)—Committee appointed to prepare it, 117; reported, committed, *ibid*.; read, humbly begging leave to approach his majesty's throne, and to represent some of the many grievances with which his majesty's faithful people of this island are at present afflicted; to make known to his majesty that their lives and properties are imminently endangered by a late intercourse, authorized by government, with the ports of St. Domingo in the possession of black brigands, or French recruited slaves, thereby affording them facilities to destroy the colonial system of Jamaica; that a perseverance in employing African negroes as soldiers for their protection is not only abhorrent to their feelings, but at this time pregnant with the most dangerous evils, from an apprehension that they have been disposed to conspire with the slaves for rebellion, an occurrence likely to take place from a practice in the second West-India regiment of suffering white privates and even white non-commissioned officers, when degraded, to be punished by black drummers, a practice tending directly to overturn our local policy, and to break down the barriers between master and slave, as also from the intercourse of our negroes of both sexes with the non-commissioned officers and privates of the said regiment; confidently relying on his majesty's wisdom and justice, they submit their unhappy condition to his most gracious consideration, and pray that their grievances may be redressed; passed; resolution that the commissioners of corre-

spondence do transmit the same to the agent, instructing him to have it presented in the most acceptable manner, 140.

III. (10 Sess. A. 1809.)—Resolution for preparing a petition to his majesty respecting the persons implicated in the atrocious conspiracy for setting fire to the city of Kingston, 224; prepared; committed, 230; ordered to be engrossed, 232; read, assuring his majesty that in no part of his dominions are his faithful people impressed with a livelier sense of his royal virtues, praying permission to express their admiration of the firmness with which he resisted the introduction into his dominions of the delusive doctrines of liberty and equality, which have overturned the most venerable institutions, and established a military despotism, in the fairest regions of the old world, adverting to the horrors produced by these principles in St. Domingo, and informing his majesty that the same principles have been disseminated in this island, and two conspiracies for carrying the same into execution have been discovered; that for the last of these conspiracies two ringleaders have been prosecuted to conviction and executed; that twenty-two other slaves are in custody for having been engaged in the same nefarious practices; that the overt acts which could be proved against these last might not be sufficient for their conviction, and in that case an act of the imperial parliament stands in the way of their transportation, and so detains in the colony a band of conspirators inconsistent with its safety; praying his majesty's gracious interposition for quelling the minds of his majesty's faithful subjects of this island, by giving the governor and admiral directions for the removal of the said conspirators; promising to enact such laws as may be necessary to indemnify the persons acting under the orders of the governor and admiral in the business; and to raise money to pay the value of the slaves to their owners, and to cover all the expenses, passed, 233.

IV. (1 Sess. A. 1810.)—Committee appointed to prepare it, 305; presented; committed; ordered to be engrossed, 321; read, representing the many grievances his majesty's faithful subjects labour under from the provisions in the American intercourse act; not questioning the wisdom of parliament in passing the same, but assuring his majesty that it could not have any effect in discouraging contraband trade; that should the augmenting the number of custom-houses be found inexpedient, the stationing an officer of the customs at Annotto-Bay, to permit the loading and unloading of neutral, would effect the purpose they desire, and prove a check to illicit traffic; humbly imploring his majesty to direct his ministers to submit to parliament the propriety of repealing the American

American intercourse act, as far as it restrains the loading and unloading of neutrals to ports where custom-houses are established, or to grant such other relief as to his majesty may seem meet, passed, 392; message to his grace, requesting him to transmit the same in the most acceptable manner, 331; his grace agrees, 332; the commissioners of correspondence ordered to instruct the agent to use his most strenuous endeavours for effecting the same purpose, 339.

VIII. (9 Sess. A. 1809.)—For his speech at the opening of the session; committee appointed to prepare it, 59; presented; committed; ordered to be engrossed, 61; read, returning thanks for his grace's speech at the opening of the session, and for having taken the earliest opportunity of reassembling the legislative body of this island; recognizing his majesty's gracious condescension in his commanding the minutes of the court-martial to be laid before the house, and his justice in establishing by the highest authority that there was nothing objectionable in their application for the same; regretting that his majesty's government have directed his grace to choose a mode of communication, which has been usually conciliatory, to abridge and circumscribe the privileges and proceedings of the house, asserting their inherent right to every privilege exercised by the commons house of parliament, and refusing to receive as a favour depending on his majesty's government the attendance of witnesses required by the house, or the removal of the restrictions attempted to be imposed by major-general Carnichael's order, as their receiving them in that manner would suppose a power of continuing such restrictions, or renewing them when deemed expedient; observing that the house has always regulated its proceedings by constitutional principles and established precedents, and that in ordering the attendance, and conducting the examination, of witnesses, they will adhere to the regular usage of parliament; receiving with high satisfaction his grace's assurances of his desire to maintain their rights and privileges; promising to provide for the exigencies

of the country, and trusting to dispatch their business with temper and unanimity; passed; his grace appoints to be attended; presented by the whole house, 62; his grace's answer, *ibid.*

IX. (9 Sess. A. 1809.)—An address to his grace the governor, presented by a member in his place, read, stating that, from the long continuance of the embargo in the ports of the United States of America, a very great scarcity prevails of all kinds of lumber, particularly of white-oak staves for puncheons, for which no proper substitute has been discovered in the island; that a severe drought has occasioned a failure of the Guinea-corn crops, and prevented the planting of other provisions, the effects of which are now felt, and will be still more severely felt, by the inhabitants and their slaves, if measures be not adopted to procure a foreign supply; that since the removal of the embargo large quantities of lumber and provisions have been deposited in the neutral colonies, from whence they might be obtained were his grace to exercise the powers vested in him, by permitting the importation in British vessels; that by late acts of the imperial parliament foreign vessels are permitted to carry on this trade, which warrants their expectation that his grace will extend the same privilege to British ships, which alone can relieve the wants of this colony; that, impressed with a just sense of his grace's exertions to promote the prosperity of this country, they submit their distresses to his consideration, and rely on his exercising the powers where-with he is vested for their relief; resolved, *nem. con.* that the said address do pass, 140; his grace appoints to be attended, presented by the whole house, 141; his grace's answer, *ibid.*

X. (10 Sess. A. 1809.)—For his speech at the opening of the session; committee appointed to prepare it, 145; reported, 146; read, thanking his grace for his speech, and for his consideration of their convenience in not convening them sooner, and expressing their readiness at all times to sacrifice their own convenience to the public service; accepting his promised co-operation in promoting the interests of this colony with cordiality; promising to take the supplies into early consideration, and to expedite the public business; his grace appoints to be attended, 148; presented by the whole house, 149; his grace's answer, *ibid.*

A. 1810.)—For his speech at the opening of the session; committee appointed to prepare it, 246; presented, 252; read, thanking his grace for his speech, and for his attention to their private convenience; expressing their confidence in his grace's earnest desire to promote the interests of this island, and promising their sincere and efficient co-operation; assuring his grace that they will take the necessary supplies into early consideration, and use their utmost endeavours to expedite the public business; passed, 253; his grace appoints to be attended, presented by the whole house; his grace's answer, 254.
