SETTING forth the distresses and grievances under which the island labours, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it, 16; memorial and petition prepared; committed, 36; considered; reported; read, 40; passed, 43; sent to the council for their concurrence, 49; agreed to by them, with amendments, 52; amendments agreed to; council acquainted of the blanks being filled up, and of a committee being appointed to join a committee of their board, to request the lieutenant-governor to transmit it, *ibid.*; his honour waited on, 56.

II. (*Ibid.*).—Praying his majesty will be pleased to confirm his honour Alured Clarke, esquire, in the full government of the island, resolved on, *nem. con.*; committee appointed to prepare it, 71; memorial and petition prepared; committed; considered; reported, 72; read; passed, and sent to the council for their concurrence, 74; agreed to by them, 76; council informed of the blanks being filled up, and of the committee of correspondence being directed to transmit it to the agent, to be laid before his majesty, 77.

III. (10 Sess. A. 1785).—Setting forth the distresses and grievances under which the island labours, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it, 155; memorial and petition prepared; committed, 160; considered; reported, 161; read; passed, 168; sent to the council for their concurrence; agreed to by them, with amendments; amendments disagreed to, and council acquainted therewith, who adhere to them; the memorial ordered to be transmitted by the committee of correspondence to certain gentlemen, to be delivered to his majesty, 169.

IV. (11 Sess. A. 1786).—Setting forth the distresses and grievances under which the island labours, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it, 244; memorial and petition prepared; committed; considered; reported, 252; read, 258; passed, and sent to the council for their concurrence, 259; disagreed to by them; the lieutenant-governor desired to transmit it, 260.

V. (3 Sess. A. 1788).—Testifying the grateful sense the house entertains of his goodness in permitting his son, prince William Henry, to favour them with his presence, and expressing their admiration of the virtues of the prince, resolved on, *nem. con.*; committee appointed to prepare it, 455; prepared, 456; read; passed, and sent to the council for their concurrence, 457; agreed to by them; council acquainted of the blanks being filled up, and of a committee being appointed to join a committee of their board to request the lieutenant-governor to transmit it, 458; his honour waited on, *ibid.*

VI. (*Ibid.*).—Beseeching him to issue such instructions to the commander in chief as shall enable him to give his assent to a law for affording relief to the inhabitants of Cornwall, in respect of holding the assize-courts, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it, 469; petition and memorial prepared; read; passed, and sent to the council for their concurrence, 479; disagreed to by them; the lieutenant-governor desired to transmit it, 482. (v. GOVERNOR).

VII. (4 Sess. A. 1789).—Expressing their congratulations on the joyful event of his majesty's recovery from a long and dangerous illness, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it, 491; prepared, 494; read; passed, 495; sent to the council for their concurrence, 504; message from them in regard to the same, 505; the lieutenant-governor desired to transmit it, 507.

VIII. (*Ibid.*).—Setting forth the grievance the inhabitants labour under, from the Spaniards protecting the slaves eloping from the island, and refusing to deliver them up, resolved on;

committee appointed to prepare it, 519; memorial and petition prepared, 537; read, 538; passed, and sent to the council, 539; agreed to by them; council acquainted of the blanks being filled up, and of a committee being appointed to join a committee of their board, to request the lieutenant-governor to transmit it, 542; his honour waited on, 544.

IX. (2 Sess. A. 1790).—Thanking him for his attention manifested to them, on the appointment of their present worthy governor, also congratulating his majesty on the flourishing condition of his dominions, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it, 573; prepared; committed; considered; reported, 577; read; passed, 578; sent to the council for their concurrence, 584; disagreed to by them; the committee of correspondence ordered to transmit it to the agent, to be presented to his majesty, 589.

X. (*Ibid.*).—On the subject of the remonstrance to the speaker of the House of Commons, respecting the slave-trade, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it, 577; address and petition prepared; committed, 582; considered; reported, 584; read, 585; passed, 586; the governor desired to transmit it, 589.

To the Lieutenant-Governor.

XI. (9 Sess. A. 1784).—For his speech at opening the session, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it; speech referred, 3; address prepared; committed, 4; considered; reported, 7; read, expressing thanks for the speech; that the measures which a consideration of the calamities in which they were involved has induced him to adopt, not only evince to them how justly they were founded, but give him the highest claims to their gratitude and esteem; that it is with the utmost concern they learn the total destruction, in the late storm, of some of the public barracks, and of the material injury which others have sustained; and that in his expression of satisfaction at the re-establishment of general peace they sincerely concur; passed; his honour appoints to be attended; his answer, 7.

XII. (*Ibid.*).—To prolong the permission for bringing in provisions and lumber, in foreign bottoms, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it, 17; prepared; committed; considered; reported, 18; read; passed; his honour appoints to be attended; his answer, 19; address and answer referred to committee on state of the island, 29. (v. Address: XIII.)

XIII. (*Ibid.*).—Representing that their apprehensions of distress are become greatly aggravated by a sudden rise in the article of provisions, and therefore trusting that his honour will adopt the mode pointed out in their former address, as the only probable means of removing their fears of an approaching scarcity, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it, 29; prepared; committed; considered; reported, 30; recommended, 31; again considered; reported, 32; read; passed; his honour appoints to be attended; his answer, 34.

XIV. (10 Sess. A. 1785).—For his speech at opening the session, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it; speech referred, 95; address prepared; committed; considered; reported, 97; read, expressing thanks for the speech; that though the calamities with which they have been of late repeatedly visited, have involved them in circumstances of great distress, they will grant such supplies as may be necessary for the repairs of the barracks and other public buildings, the support of his majesty's troops, and the necessary expence of the civil government; passed; his honour appoints to be attended; his answer, 99.

XV. (11 Sess. A. 1786).—For his speech at opening the session, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it; speech referred, 171; address prepared; committed; considered; reported,

To the Lieutenant-Governor; continued.

ported, 173; read, expressing thanks for the speech; that they will proceed to make the necessary provision for the ordinary expences of the civil government, and the support of the troops; passed; his honour appoints to be attended; his answer, 174.

XVI. (1 Sess. A. 1787.)—For his speech at opening the session, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it; speech referred, 268; address prepared; committed, 271; considered; reported, 272; read, expressing thanks for the speech; that the re-establishment of public credit being essential to every interest of the country, it is their duty to exert their earnest endeavours to accomplish this great and important aim; that they shall, in due deference to his honour's recommendation, pay an immediate attention to the state of the public funds, and they trust that the plans they shall adopt will render those funds productive in future, passed; his honour appoints to be attended; his answer, 274.

XVII. (2 Sess. A. 1787.)—For his speech at opening the session, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it; speech referred, 348; address prepared; read, expressing thanks for the speech; that although they are sorry for the occasion which induced his honour to deny their request for an adjournment, it affords them particular satisfaction to reflect that such request was not presented until provision had been made for the subsistence of his majesty's troops; and that their resolution to withhold any further bills of supply, until satisfaction was received from the council, could not, therefore, have been productive of inconvenience to the public, or embarrassment to his honour's administration, &c.; passed; appoints to be attended, 349; his answer, 350.

XVIII. (3 Sess. A. 1788.)—For his speech at opening the session, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it; speech referred, 399; address prepared; committed; considered; reported, 401; read, expressing thanks for the speech; that they shall make every proper provision for the necessary expenditures, incurred in consequence of their votes of credit, when the accounts shall be laid before them; and they shall provide for the expences attending the civil government and the support of the troops, as far as their circumstances under the heavy burdens laid on some of their staples will admit; that the distribution of the arms among the several battalions of militia, during their recess, demonstrates his honour's attention to the safety of the island; passed, 402; appoints to be attended; his answer, 403.

XIX. (*Ibid.*)—Congratulating him on the arrival of his royal highness prince William Henry in the island, resolved on, *nem. con.*; prepared; committed; considered; reported; read, 455; passed; his honour appoints to be attended; his answer, 456.

XX. (4 Sess. A. 1789.)—For his speech at opening the session, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it; speech referred, 491; address prepared, 492; read, expressing thanks

To the Lieutenant-Governor; continued.

for the speech; that the indissolubility of their beloved sovereign was felt and deplored by all ranks of men in his majesty's dominions; that they rejoice in his recovery; that when the estimates of such repairs as may be found necessary for the improvement and preservation of the public buildings are laid before them, proper provision shall be made for them, as well as for the ordinary expences of the government; passed, 493; his honour appoints to be attended; his answer, 494.

XXI. (5 Sess. A. 1789.)—For his speech at opening the session, resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it; speech referred, 557; address prepared; read, expressing thanks for the speech; that in the late session they had completed the whole of the public business on their part, in hopes of enjoying that recess so absolutely necessary in their respective parishes at this season of the year, when they were suddenly interrupted by his majesty's council having encroached on the unquestioned privilege of the house, by attempting to alter a money bill; passed, 557; his honour appoints to be attended; his answer, 558.

To the Governor.

XXII. (1 Sess. A. 1790.)—Thanking him for his speech at opening the session; congratulating him on his safe arrival; expressing the just sense they entertain of the distinguished honour conferred on them, by his excellency's appointment to this government, and assuring him they shall proceed with all proper dispatch in raising such supplies as they may deem requisite; resolved on; committee appointed to prepare it; speech referred, 562; address prepared, 563; read; passed; his excellency appoints to be attended; his answer, 566.

XXIII. (2 Sess.
