Rev. John Wiswall. Journal and Correspondence, 1636-1812, predominant 1770-1792

Section 1.1 Falmouth (1770-74)

- 4 Nov 1771, to Henry Bellew (Exeter, England)
 - State of his church and parish: general state of finances; progress building church, requests assistance with; includes petition from Wiswall and wardens of St. Paul's Church, and includes background pertaining to hardships
- *7 Aug 1775, (Boston), to Henry Bellew
 - Gives account of the May 9th incident in which he was imprisoned, includes mention
 of his family; his situation now as chaplain to 2 regiments- 63rd and 44th, and his
 intentions, hopes to go to England, mentions his sons.
- 19 June 1770, (Falmouth), Massachusetts, to Rev. Daniel Burton
 - Governor Shirley's new law as it relates to church and taxes; death of Judge of Probate, Waldo and its effect on the church.
- 6 Jan 1771, (Falmouth), to Rev. Daniel Burton
 - State of his congregation baptisms, marriages, buried; enduring effects of the late unhappy disturbances.
- 1 Nov 1771 to Rev. Burton, Secretary of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel
 - Progress in building church; obstacles; support of strangers in port; state of his congregation – baptisms, buried, marriages, communicants, proprietors, parishioners, males and families; mentions dissenters and relationship with.
- 25 Nov 1772, to Burton, Secretary of the Society
 - His financial situation; flock increasing; teaches for extra money; donation from Francis Waldo; state of his congregation, as above; requests books for his parishioners.
- 27 Mar 1773, from Rev. Hind, new Secretary (Westminster)
 - o Books will be sent
- 19 Nov 1773, (Falmouth), to Hind
 - Books received, more donations from Waldo, including land for burying ground; health-infection spread throughout community, measles, fever, dysentery; went to Rhode Island with wife for her health, reflection on his mission as comparison to; great progress, expands on; church progress due to industry of warden Simmons; Mr. Gardener's request for mission at Gardeners-Town, eastern frontier, speaks on behalf of.

Note: *16 Sept 1774, (Falmouth), to Hind, see Boston section; and brief summary of Falmouth church history, see the end of the London section.

- 30 May 1775, (Boston), to Hind, Secretary at Westminster
 - Recounts in detail his experience surrounding May 9, 1775, wherein he was taken prisoner by Col. Thompson, while with Mr. Mowat, Commander of one of his Majesty's ships; mentions effects on family and parishioners.
- 15 Apr 1775, (Boston), note from E. Oxnard to Wiswall on ship Canceaux
 - Sorry he must leave, also note from Wiswall in Boston, May 31 to the Wardens/Vestry/Parishioners of St. Pauls Church indicating same.
- 11 Aug 1775, (Boston), to Hind
 - Refers to the situation in Falmouth and how it's not possible for minister to reside at; his and family's situation; request to go to England with explanation.
- 29 Nov 1775, (Boston), to Hind
 - Left for England, mentions seeing Falmouth and church within burning; mentions he included notitia parochialis for Falmouth for 1766-1775.
- *16 Sept 1774, (Falmouth), to Hind
 - Relating to the *increasing public distractions*, determined to espouse either side, explains reasons for not agreeing to contribute to the relief of sufferers in Boston – to encourage Boston to oppose Act of Parliament; dissenting ministers encourage the people; some flock has left due to; great distance from brethren for advisement; state of congregation: baptisms, marriages, burials.

Section 1.3 London & Oxford (1780-82)

- 9 Feb 1781, (London), to Mrs. Thomas Brown in Halifax, Nova Scotia
 - Briefly describes his last three years, mentions his boys and friend; recollections on his past visit to Halifax.
- 20 Dec 1780, to Jeremiah Dummer Rogers at Halifax
 - Financial matters
- 30 May 1781, to H. Willard, Westminster
 - Describes Oxford and his situation therein.
- 5 Dec 1780, to Treasury
 - Petition for relief, mentions health reasons for not being able to act as naval chaplain any further, last ship on board was Rainbow, and present salary.
- 6 Apr 1782, to Lord Marquis of Rockinham
 - Request for assistance, refers to letter above, and that he's served in the Navy under Admirals Howe, Barrington, Byron, Palmer and Rodney.
- 8 Apr 1782, to Society for the Propagation of the Gospel
 - Requests mission at Albany or Stratford, and reasons.

<u>Section 1.4 Correspondence with Rev. Morice, Secretary to the Society (SPG): Cornwallis (1783-89)</u>

- 12 Dec 1783, (Cornwallis), Nova Scotia, to Rev. Morice (England)
 - Generally describes and explains his parish and his optimism, in relation to, for example, churches, meeting houses, teachers, inhabitants' religious inclinations; mentions arrival of loyalists.
- 24 Aug 1784, (Cornwallis), to Rev. Morice
 - Brief summary of the last year's doings for Cornwallis, Horton and Digby; mentions difficulties in Cornwallis, Anabaptists in Horton, and increase in refugees in Digby; state of Digby: baptised 7 infants and 3 adult negroes, and nos. for his own mission; requests library.
- 25 Feb & 15 June 1784, from Rev. Morice, Halton Garden
 - Esteem towards Col. Burbige; directions to contact Mr. Palmer of Boston for a library.
- 38 Dec 1784, (Cornwallis), to Rev. Morice
 - Member nos., no money from parishioners, building of a parish house burden mostly falls on Col. Burbidge and Mr. Belcher.
- 16 May 1785, (Cornwallis), to Rev. Morice
 - Difficulties: severe winter, uncomfortable church as not finished inside; religious education of children: catechism and catechist Mr. Fox and his impressions; his impressions on dissenters.
- 22 Nov 1785, (Cornwallis), to Rev. Morice
 - Nos. catechisms; glebes at Cornwallis and Horton values thereof; Horton refugees leave, service no longer required; Wilmot –expectations for bright future there; Cornwallis discouragement explained; salary; state of congregation at his mission & at Wilmot and Digby (includes Horton), blacks included separated; laws concerning marriage and the opportunity for more income; request for tracts re. drunkenness, profanity, extravagances, idleness, vices which reign in Horton and Cornwallis.
- 19 June 1786, to Rev. Morice
 - Wilmot general summary of parishioners, request for catechist; Horton glebe, finances; congregation state of: baptisms-Cornwallis 6 infants, 1 adult, Wilmot-5 infants, married at Cornwallis 1 couple.
- 7 Oct 1785 from Rev. Morice
 - Information pertaining to Cornwallis and Horton glebe allotments.
- 4 Apr 1786 from Rev. Morice
 - Concerned about Horton, which Wiswall has dismissed from his charge; glad to hear about the possibilities at Wilmot, especially re. land; sent books and tracts.
- 30 July 1786, (Cornwallis) to Rev. Morice
 - Explains discouragement at Cornwallis and Horton; difficulties with parishioners at Cornwallis – regarding Wiswall's sharing with them a communique from Morice concerning the parish's backwardness in not fulfilling their responsibilities to Wiswall for a salary, (Mr. Burbidge to further explain).
- Certification to Commissioners of American Claims from Herbert Sawyer
 - Wiswall was a Chaplain of ship Boyne under his command in consequence of loyalty.
- 30 July 1786, (Cornwallis), to Rev. Morice

- Horton glebes-issue surrounding misappropriation of for benefit of Presbyterian minister, improvements and general value; Cornwallis glebe – description and rents, value.
- Power of attorney to William Read of Horton
 - o Re. Horton glebe lands issue; glebes described.
- 7 Aug 1786, (Cornwallis) to Rev. Morice
 - Horton-explains reasons for dismissal from his charge and how he will secure the
 glebes, Anabaptist shoemaker preaches there; Wilmot content to preach where
 he's wanted half his time and describes situation and parishioners there, gives nos.
 baptised, glebe lands and role of B. Ruggles and Maj. Barkley?; books received and
 distributed; tracts concerning vices distributed everywhere as they greatly prevail
 among old inhabitants.
- 30 Sept 1786, to Rev. Morice
 - Horton glebes valuation of undertaken and detailed therein, tenant lease, profit expectations; Cornwallis glebe – explains how more attention was needed, his efforts to make them profitable.
- 24 May 1787, to Rev. Peters
 - Difficulty between he and parishioners at Cornwallis, particularly Mr. Belcher explains Peters was misled as he never had the least altercation, excepting Mr.
 Belcher who would carry his resentment so far as to injure my interest and the
 interest of the church, indicates dispute resolved; believes church will not flourish
 here at Cornwallis; heard they are now quarrelling with Rev. Graham, Church of
 Scotland at same place because he won't be governed by them and is a zealous
 loyalist.
- 29 May 1787, (Cornwallis), to Rev. Morice
 - Difficulties travelling in winter didn't go to Wilmot until March and then baptised 8 children, travels much distance to preach; Cornwallis church location problems for parishioners in distance; summarises his travels in summer with his expenses not covered Wilmot has no money, Cornwallis refuses; Notitia since April 1786: baptisms at Cornwallis, Wilmot, Horton; marriages at Cornwallis; 5 communicants.
- 27 March 1787, (Cornwallis), to Rev. Morice
 - Cornwallis Township church land to be surveyed for free, briefly described;
 includes survey return describing lots, 7 July 1787
- 11 Dec 1787, (Cornwallis), to Rev. Morice
 - Demonstration of gratitude for new catechist: flock bought land, built log house for school for teacher Mr. William Cropley, a suffering loyalist; briefly compares settlement at Wilmot to Cornwallis; believes even with some government funding, parishioners at Cornwallis will not contribute to finish church, hard on his health; compensation for losses received and building a house at Wilmot; journeyed over 700 miles last summer and not compensated; state of congregation – baptisms, etc.
- 17 June 1788, (Cornwallis), to Rev. Morice
 - Cornwallis partial salary received from for the first time ever, salary never been sufficient to support family; state of congregation: nos. married; baptised at Cornwallis, includes blacks, and at Wilmot.

- 2 Jan 1789, (Cornwallis), to Rev. Morice
 - Church doings this past summer; notitia: baptisms, burials, marriages, communicants (Cornwallis and Wilmot include blacks); Cornwallis congregation increasing, explains why backward in subscriptions; requests mission at Wilmot if division occurs and the reason for; discusses catechist, Mr. Cropley, and attendance by dissenters; church to be built; administered Lords Supper for 1st time at Wilmot Mountain, optimistic for its future; Cornwallis church still unfinished.
- 27 March 1789, (Cornwallis), to Rev. Morice
 - Drawn on Treasury for half year's salary; roads impassable, couldn't travel to Wilmot.
- 6 Mar 1789, from Rev. Morice
 - Change in mission, if he chooses to remove to Wilmot, Twyning will take over Cornwallis; compensation for what he's laid out on glebes will be considered in the future.
- 30 May 1789, (Cornwallis), to Rev. Morice
 - Property-overview of, including value, income from and improvements; list of profits from Cornwallis, including parsonage house and glebe, land and lease, dyke Horton, pasture, salary paid by subscription; list of profits at Wilmot, including salary and 1000 acre glebe; mentions his investment in Cornwallis glebe.
- Falmouth Church Records
 - Very brief note on beginnings, Wiswall's evacuation, its burning and the years' opened-10 years, 5 months.
- 3 July 1789, (Cornwallis), to Rev. Morice
 - Resignation from Cornwallis, removing family in spring to Wilmot; salary unknown.

Section 2.1 Letters and petitions from Boston & London

- 7 Aug 1775, (Boston), to Mrs. Hannah Minnott at Brunswick
 - o Personal letter to family re. wife/daughter deaths of, etc.
- 22 May 1775, (Boston), to Thomas Graves
 - Account of circumstances surrounding his imprisonment at Falmouth May 9th.
- April 1775, Petition to Thomas Gage, Commander-in-Chief
 - o Details his distressed situation; requests assistance.
- 5 Jan 1776, (Boston), to Henry Bellew, Commander of his Majesty's Ship, Liverpool
 - Even though appointed chaplain of *Liverpool*, explains why his situation requires him to go to England.
- 29 March 1776, (London), Petition to Lord Sandwich
 - Description of his situation, requests assistance and to be appointed to guard ship in lieu of *Liverpool*, with his son along as schoolmaster; includes "Extracts of Mr. Pitt's Speech in the House of Commons," concerning America.

Section 2.2 Family Anecdotes & Journal

• Family history starting in 1636, includes details of his immediate family, particularly his description and sentiments about his wife; journal contains, for example: description of Kinsail Ireland and its people, 1777; naval movements and intelligence during his time as naval chaplain on the *Boyne*, in the West Indies, such as: list of killed and wounded, ammo expended, and the line of battle in action at Granada, and St. Lucia,1779 (p 208-210); line of battle at Gros Islet/Port Royal, 1780 (p.219); Observations of St. Lucia, July 1780 – geography and batteries; and general remarks re. men on ship – spread of infection and resultant deaths, and their overall conditions, July-Aug 1780 (p221-2, 5-6); arrives in London Dec 1780.
